Sheridan College is offering a new and innovative four-year Bachelor of Applied Arts in Early Childhood Leadership (ECL) that prepares you to become a leader in early childhood education and care.

Students, as they enter their third and fourth years, will develop teambuilding and management skills and are encouraged to engage in advocacy and leadership in their field.

Graduates of the program enjoy a broad range of employment opportunities, says Di Francesco.

"Some of our graduates will go on to own early childhood centres and programs, some will become directors, many will co-ordinate programs for specific services in our region.

"We're also looking at research opportunities in our field and how to expand peoples' knowledge and the public's awareness."
